Invitation to the Great Three Days

* Friends in Christ, in this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to struggle against all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This year, the experience of pandemic has deepened our experience of human separation, and given a more intense desire for community with each other, with our world, and with God. This has been a struggle, but it is the struggle to which we were called in Baptism.

Hear then the Good News - God never wearies of forgiving sin and giving the peace of reconciliation. On this night let us confess our sin against God and our neighbour, and enter the celebration of the great Three Days reconciled with God and one another.

Confession (Read together)

God who is love, we come admitting the brokenness in our lives: the brokenness between ourselves, the brokenness between nations, the brokenness between humanity and creation.

Give us the courage to acknowledge this truth.

Give us the faith to trust your presence.

Give us the desire to share your healing, promised and provided in Jesus Christ (†) our Lord. Amen.

* We are forgiven. We are reconciled. We are one. Thanks be to God!

Gospel Reading

* The Holy Gospel according to John.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, 'Lord, are you going to wash my feet?' Jesus answered, 'You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand.' Peter said to him, 'You will never wash my feet.' Jesus answered, 'Unless I wash you, you have no share with me.' Simon Peter said to him, 'Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!' Jesus said to him, 'One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you.' For he knew who was to betray him.

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, 'Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

Jesus said, 'Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

Reflection

* Jesus calls us to serve.

And we have done this! In many and various way, you, and the congregations to which you belong, have been serving the community and the world for decades, and even centuries.

It is frequently a challenge. It takes time, and effort, and finances, and coordination, and a whole bunch of willing hands.

But it's what we do. Because Jesus has called us to do it.

And we are continuing to serve. Right now.

By sitting in our living rooms or kitchens (or wherever you are!), and by praying this service in our separate homes, we are serving our neighbours and our world. And we are doing it together.

In a very real way, we are fasting. We are giving things up, important things, for a bigger purpose.

We are fasting from coming together for worship, and fasting from Communion. We are fasting from eating together in restaurants. We are fasting from parties, and sporting events, and concerts, and quilting bees. Some of us, or some of our neighbours, are even having to fast from work.

For a bigger purpose. A holy purpose.

We are fasting to serve our neighbours. We are fasting to serve our world. We are fasting to keep people healthy.

This is a difficult time, for all of us. It contains challenges which none of us have ever faced before. We don't know how long it will continue, or who will be affected, or what the results will be.

But let's be honest with ourselves - We have never known these things! A life of service is alway ambiguous, always a challenge.

So tonight, as our journey to the cross is drawing to a close, we take a breath. We remember that Jesus served his disciples. We remember that Jesus serves us. We remember that Jesus calls *us* to serve. We remember that everything we are doing right now is for the sake of our neighbours and our world; neighbours and a world which are all loved by God.

"By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, *if you... have... love....*" Amen.

We also ask your blessing for those who serve in this dangerous time in health care, food distribution, sanitation, government and mental health. We pray especially for those we name before you.

Psalm 22, A Lament (Read together)

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning?

O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest.

Yet you are holy, enthroned on the praises of Israel.

In you our ancestors trusted; they trusted, and you delivered them.

To you they cried, and were saved; in you they trusted, and were not put to shame.

But I am a worm, and not human; scorned by others, and despised by the people.

All who see me mock at me; they make mouths at me, they shake their heads;

'Commit your cause to the Lord; let him deliver—let him rescue the one in whom he delights!'

Yet it was you who took me from the womb; you kept me safe on my mother's breast.

On you I was cast from my birth, and since my mother bore me you have been my God.

Do not be far from me, for trouble is near and there is no one to help.

Many bulls encircle me, strong bulls of Bashan surround me;

they open wide their mouths at me, like a ravening and roaring lion.

I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint;

my heart is like wax; it is melted within my breast;

my mouth is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue sticks to my jaws;

you lay me in the dust of death.

But you, O Lord, do not be far away! O my help, come quickly to my aid!

Deliver my soul from the sword, my life from the power of the dog!

Save me from the mouth of the lion!

From the horns of the wild oxen you have rescued me.

I will tell of your name to my brothers and sisters; in the midst of the congregation I will praise you:

You who fear the Lord, praise him! All you offspring of Jacob, glorify him;

stand in awe of him, all you offspring of Israel!

For he did not despise or abhor the affliction of the afflicted;

he did not hide his face from me, but heard when I cried to him.

From you comes my praise in the great congregation; my vows I will pay before those who fear him.

The poor shall eat and be satisfied; those who seek him shall praise the Lord.

May your hearts live for ever!

All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the Lord,

and all the families of the nations shall worship before him.

For dominion belongs to the Lord, and he rules over the nations.
