Gospel Reading

* The Holy Gospel according to John.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, ‘They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.’ Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus’ head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, ‘Woman, why are you weeping?’ She said to them, ‘They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.’ When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, ‘Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?’ Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, ‘Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.’ Jesus said to her, ‘Mary!’ She turned and said to him in Hebrew, ‘Rabbouni!’ (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, ‘Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, “I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.”’ Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, ‘I have seen the Lord’; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Reflection

* Easter changes everything.

But let’s be honest. Saying this is..., well, it’s predictable. It’s obvious. It’s so obvious, in fact, that it hardly needs to be said.

But it does. It needs to be said. It needs to be said loudly, and clearly, and then it needs to be said again.

If nothing else, it needs to be repeated again and again..., for *us*! For the church! For believers. *We* are the ones who need to hear it over and over again.

Martin Luther himself said, “I need to hear the gospel over and over, because I forget it over and over.”

We, as individuals, forget. We live in a *world* which forgets. And quite frankly, there are forces out there which *want us* to forget. Because people who forget can be convinced to do things which benefit those forces.

If we forget that our identity is given by God, we will be open to thinking that our job, or our nationality, or our race tells us who we are. So we will compete instead of love.

If we forget that our value is declared by God, we will susceptible to suggestions that our wealth, or lack of it, is the truest indicator of our worth. So we will compare instead of love.

If we forget that God's promise surrounds us, we will be vulnerable to anything that comes along promising safety. So we will buy guns. Or drugs. Or bigger defence budgets. Or outrageous security systems. So we will hide instead of love.

So. For the sake of life, we will repeat, over and over again, that Easter changes all of this.

Easter says that our identity *is* given by God. So we can love instead of compete.

Easter says that our value *is* declared by God. So we can love instead of compare.

Easter says that our security is grounded in God. So we can love instead of hide.

Easter changes all of this.

Easter changes everything.

Ultimately, Easter changes *us*!

Which is why *we* say, over and over again, that Christ is risen.

Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!
