Gospel Reading

* The Holy Gospel according to John

Jesus said to his disciples, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come

again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going."

Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?"

Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him."

Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied."

Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it."

Reflection

* "Life," it is said, "is lived looking forward, but it is understood looking backward." I think there is a fair amount of wisdom in this statement.

That is a primary reason we are reading this particular story today.

This is technically not an "Easter story." In John's gospel, this conversation takes place the evening before Good Friday, on what the church now calls Maundy Thursday. Jesus has gathered his friends and followers together, they eat a meal, they talk, and Jesus lays some pretty heavy-duty theology on them.

The way John tells his story, the disciples are left scratching their heads. They seem incapable of wrapping their heads around what Jesus is saying. Thomas doesn't "know the way," and Philip demands that Jesus stop with all the fancy explanations and get to the point.

Unfortunately for Thomas and Philip, Jesus' answers to their questions only raise more questions!

But here's the thing. I think John was trying to get his readers (and therefore, *us*), to *look back* on these things, so that we can understand our life a bit more as we move forward.

Remember, John's community already knew the ending of this story, just like we do. They already knew that Easter had happened, just like we do. They already knew about both the cross and the empty tomb, just like we do.

I think John wants us to read this story from the perspective of Good Friday and Easter. He wants us to listen to these past "conversations" using the lens of what we already know of the story.

In fact, that's really the only way that John's gospel can be understood.

It's only on this side of Easter that Jesus' promise to prepare a place for us makes sense.

It's only on this side of Easter that Jesus' statement that, by knowing Jesus we know the Father, makes sense.

It's only on this side of Easter that the Father being glorified in the Son makes sense.

I would suggest we try to remember this as we wrestle with our current, Covid-19 existence, the tragedy of Portapique, and everything else that seems to be coming at us like a runaway train.

A lot of this stuff isn't making sense. And we don't know how, or when, it's *going* to make sense. And, quite frankly, Jesus isn't answering *our* question the way we would like, either.

But in the risen Jesus, we catch a glimpse of the future. We catch a glimpse of *our* future. We catch a glimpse of the future of all creation.

Granted, this glimpse doesn't make everything make sense. But it does give us hope: hope that the future *is* in God's loving hands; hope that our present situation is encompassed by that same love of God; hope that the things that make no sense are not outside the new creation which has been begun in Easter; hope that points us forward, even here, even now.

So, even when things make no sense, we continue to proclaim together that Christ is risen.

Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia! Amen
