Reflection

* Water

The stuff of life.

Our bodies are, on average, about 60% water.

The surface of the earth is over 70% water.

We are alive because of water.

Without water, we die. Without water, we don't exist.

Without water, life on this whole *planet* doesn't exist.

So it does not really surprise us

that one of the sacraments centres around water.

Baptism makes us Christians. It makes us part of the body. It brings us in.

We *belong* because of water.

And this is not unique to Christianity.

Many religious traditions use water in their ceremonies, their entrance rites.

It's kind of a universal thing!

Think of all the uses to which we put water:

Drinking. Cleaning. Cooking. Bathing. Swimming. Fishing. Curling.

We could go on and on.

Think of all the images which refer to water:

Dipped. Submerged. Splashed. Drooling. Moisten. Overflow. Soaking. Diluted.

Again, we could go on and on.

So water is not just about life.

Water is also about living.

Water is life is living is baptism is new life.

Water is a sign of God's love for life, for living, for us.

Water reminds us.

That is, re-minds us; that is, gives us new minds.

Water makes us think about life, about living, about God's call on our living.

Water makes us ask questions.

Uncomfortable questions.

Like, how are we using this precious gift which gives life?

(Not well, actually)

Like, how many bottles of water are purchased around the world?

(One million every minute)

Like, wait! Did you just say *one million every minute*?

(I did)

Like, where does the water come from?

(Lakes and rivers and water tables,

the same sources as our drinking water)

Like, what happens to all those bottles once we're done with them?

(It's estimated that 14% of them are recycled)

(That's all; 14%)

Like, what happens to the rest of them?

(They end up in landfills, or beside the road, or in the oceans...)

Water as convenience, as product, as commodity, as profit margin....

Holy Trinity Sunday calls us to change course.

The Trinity calls us (literally) to pay attention to water

As symbolized by the water in the bowl in front of you right now.

Put your finger into the life-liquid.

Feel the life-giving, life-sustaining wetness.

Touch your forehead with your wet finger

So that this water may re-mind you.

Touch your heart with your wet finger

That God may remove your heart of stone.

Touch your left shoulder with your wet finger

That God may breathe new life into your weary body.

Touch your right shoulder with your wet finger

That God may encourage your living

And empower your response in this water world.

The sign of the cross.

A remembrance of baptism.

An invocation of the Holy Trinity:

The One who created water

The One who walked on water and cried water and bled water

The One who still moves over the waters

And blesses the water that is you.

And now, *use* this water.

Drink it in a cup of tea.

Pour it over a potted plant.

Give the dog a drink.

Don't dump it down the drain,

Because...
