Sermon

I try to be someone who doesn't complain. Not too much, anyway! Sometimes I even succeed. But as much as I enjoy the liturgies we use, and the prayers and the readings and the flow of Holy Week and all that, I must say that I have an issue with how we start this day, this Palm Sunday, this first day of Holy Week.

My issue is found in the prayer which we used right after hearing the story of Jesus riding into Jerusalem. It begins like this:

We praise you, O God, for redeeming the world through our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

No argument with that!

Today he entered the holy city in triumph and was proclaimed messiah and king by those who spread garments and branches along his way.

That sentence is where I have my issue, when it says Jesus entered Jerusalem "in triumph."

Do we really think that Jesus was riding that colt with his arms in the air, both hands clenched into fists, smiling triumphantly at the crowd, and shouting "Yes!" in response to their cheers? That would be rather inconsistent with the picture of Jesus which the gospel writers give us.

If you look at how this scene has been portrayed in artwork through the ages, you will see that this is not how it has been understood! Jesus is not shown arriving in Jerusalem "triumphantly," as if he had just won the Stanley Cup, the World Series and the Super Bowl all at the same time! The way artists have depicted this scene universally has Jesus... looking down. He almost seems more interested in looking at the *colt* he is riding than the crowds which are surrounding him.

In spite of our opening prayer which says that Jesus entered Jerusalem "in triumph," in spite of the tradition that calls this event "The Triumphal Entry," I don't think that's the case. We are so enamoured of being "winners" that we can't see what's actually happening in front of us.

Jesus did not enter Jerusalem "triumphally." He entered Jerusalem humbly.

And the crowd seemed to get that, at least in part. The argument can reasonably be made that the people surrounding Jesus that day did not completely understand what Jesus was really about. They did not comprehend his purpose or his method; they did not grasp what he was really doing on that day. This is demonstrated by the fact that they turned their back on him so quickly, and by the end of the week were shouting "Crucify."

But people are complex creations, and I think it's unfair to paint them too simply.

They weren't cheering Jesus as if he had just won the Stanley Cup, the World Series and the Super Bowl all at the same time. And we know this because of what they were shout: "Hosanna."

Hosanna does not mean, "Yippee!" Hosanna does not mean, "We won!" Or even, "We're *going* to win!"

Hosanna means, "Save us."

As rambunctious as the crowd was, as eager and as excited, they, too had some level of humility about it all. They recognized that they needed to be pulled out of their impossible situation. They recognized that they needed to be rescued. So their cry was, "Hosanna." "Save us."

Triumphalism has been a very big problem in the church for a very long time. We have given in to the desire to be one of history's winners. And in spite of our often stated desire to faithfully follow Jesus, we have allowed triumphalism to hang around, so that it even infects our prayers. "Today Jesus entered the holy city in triumph...."

Well, maybe this year, we can do it differently. Maybe this year we open our eyes to what is actually happening in front of us, instead of interpreting everything through the lenses of what we *want* to be happening in front of us. Maybe this year we can allow ourselves to be confronted by the humility of Jesus, and join the crowd in praying the prayer of people who are beginning to recognize their need.

Maybe this year, instead of praying "Yippee," we can, with *humility*, pray the *other* prayer with which we started our service.

Sovereign God, you have established your rule in the human heart through the **servanthood** of Jesus Christ. By your Spirit, keep us in the joyful procession of those who with their tongues confess Jesus as Lord, and with their **lives** praise him as Saviour, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.
